Philadelphia will deploy additional police officers and has asked surrounding regions for law enforcement support as it braces for further unrest on Tuesday sparked by the police killing of a Black man, the police commissioner said.

[Vocabulary]

□ **deploy**: to distribute (persons or forces) systematically or strategically; to deploy troops, weapons, or resources means to make them ready to be used.

- *The president said he had no intention of deploying ground troops.*
- *The police were deployed in the town center to stop the riots.*

□ **bystander**: someone who is in a particular place by chance when an accident or an unusual event happens but who is not directly connected with it

- *It looks like an innocent bystander was killed instead of you.*
- *Three innocent bystanders were wounded in the explosion.*

□ **back off**: to move backwards from a certain position; If you back off, you move away in order to avoid problems or a fight.

- *They backed off in horror.*
- *Everyone back off and let the doctor through.*

□ **projectile**: an object that is thrown or shot forwards with force

- *People started throwing bottles and other projectiles at the police.*
- *There was a hail of projectiles from the crowd onto the pitch.*

□ **police commissioner**: a civil commissioner appointed to supervise the duties and discipline of the police

□ **assault**: to attack someone violently

- *The gang assaulted him with iron bars.*
- *She may have been sexually assaulted by her killer.*

□ **burglary**: the crime of entering a building illegally in order to steal things

- *An 11-year-old boy committed a burglary.*
- *He's been arrested for burglary.*

something such as freedom or political rights.

- *He is currently locked in a power struggle with his Prime Minister.*
- *For some children in Japan, the struggle to pass entrance examinations begins in preschool.*

- **systematic**: done according to a careful plan and in a thorough way; Something that is done in a systematic way is done according to a fixed plan, in a thorough and efficient way.
 - *a systematic approach to the cleanup of hazardous toxic waste*
 - *the systematic study of social policy*
- **racism**: a way of behaving or thinking that shows that you do not like or respect people who belong to races that are different from your own and that you believe your race is better than others. Racism also refers to the aspects of a society which prevent people of some racial groups from having the same privileges and opportunities as people from other races.
 - *Unfortunately, racism is still a problem in our society.*
 - *The authorities are taking steps to tackle racism in schools.*
- **enforce**: to make sure that a law or rule is obeyed by people; If people in authority enforce a law or a rule, they make sure that it is obeyed, usually by punishing people who do not obey it.
 - *The main role of the police is to uphold and enforce the law.*
 - *We need to enforce the law.*
- **turn out**: to be shown or be found to be
 - *Sometimes things don't turn out the way we think they're going to.*
 - *It turned out in a way beyond anyone's imagination.*
