
Myanmar security forces opened fire on protests against military rule on Myanmar security forces

□ security forces: police or soldiers responsible for maintaining security
• Clashes between the demonstrators and security forces led to two arrests.
• United Nations has expressed serious concerns over large number of killings by Indian
security forces.  □ rubber bullet: a bullet made of hard rubber; designed for use in crowd control; A rubber
bullet is a bullet made of a metal ball coated with rubber. It is intended to injure people rather than kill them, and is used by police or soldiers to control crowds during a riot.  • Rubber bullets were used to break up the demonstration.
• A 14-year old Palestinian boy suffered serious injuries after being hit by a rubber bullet
during a protest.  □ stun grenade: a less-lethal explosive device used to temporarily disorient an enemy's
senses. It is designed to produce a blinding flash of light of around 7 megacandela (Mcd) and an intensely loud "bang" of greater than 170 decibels (dB).  • He was not at home, but they found a stun grenade, a loaded .22 calibre rifle, four knives,
<ul><li>and ammunition.</li><li>The stun grenade produces blinding light and deafening noise.</li></ul>
□ <b>tear gas</b> : a gas that makes the eyes fill with tears but does not damage them; used in
dispersing crowds

• Police used tear gas to disperse the demonstrators.



$\square$ <b>Myanmar Now news agency</b> : news agency that produces in-depth investigations and has
the latest news on Yangon and other major cities in Myanmar.  □ detain: to keep someone in a police station or prison and not allow them to leave
• The act allows police to detain a suspect for up to 48 hours.
• He was arrested and detained for questioning.
□ <b>Myingyan</b> : a city and district in the Mandalay Division of central Myanmar, previously,
it was a district in the Meiktila Division of Upper Burma. It is currently the capital of Myingyan Township and lies along the National Highway 2. As of 2014, the city had a population of 276,096 and the district had 1,055,957.    Magway: the capital city of Magway Region (formerly Magway Division) of Burma
(Myanmar), and home to Magway Airport.  □ Monywa: the largest city in Sagaing Region, Myanmar, located 136 km north-west of
Mandalay on the eastern bank of the River Chindwin. Monywa is one of the largest economic cities in Myanmar.  □ justify: to show that there is a good reason for something, especially something that other
